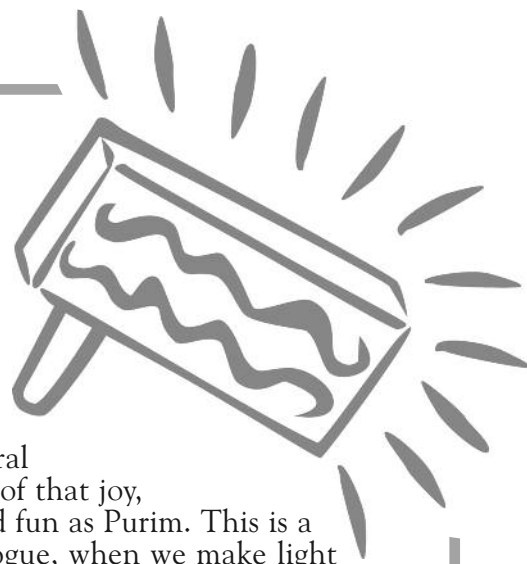

A Panel Discussion

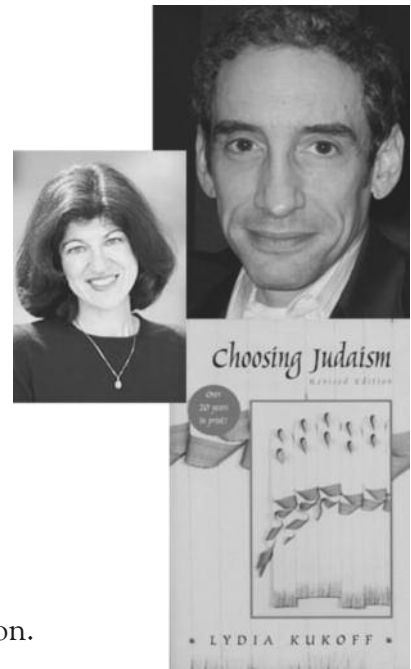
Wednesday, March 12
