Applications are available for *IYUN*, the Skirball Center's three-year certificate program in Jewish studies. Covering biblical, rabbinic, medieval and modern Jewish texts, *Iyun* is a comprehensive and intense introduction to Judaism's key texts.

What is *IYUN*?  
6 semesters • 60 weeks •

**I**YUN is a program of serious engagement with Jewish texts. It combines the broad questions of a survey course with the skill development necessary for lifelong learning. It asks such questions as: When, why and by whom was this text written? What does it address? What literary techniques does it use? How was it understood in the past, and how did it affect Jewish life? What role does it play in contemporary Judaism, and what claim might it make on my own life as a Jew?

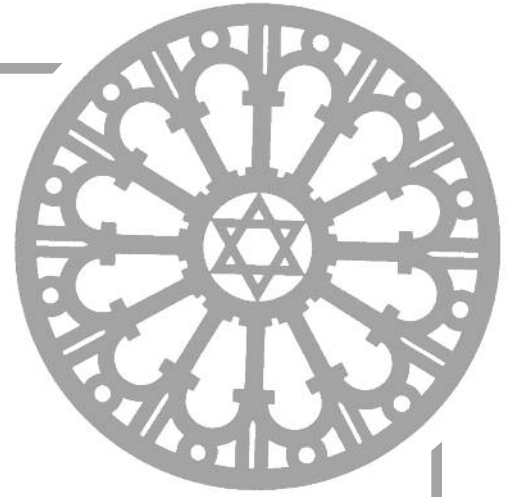

## A LESSON IN APPRECIATION

On May 15, 2008, Temple Administrator Mark Heutlinger was inducted as this year's recipient of the Samuel Sacks Achievement Award, presented by the Men's Club of Congregation Emanu-El in recognition of distinguished service to the Temple. In addition to his congratulatory praise of Mark, Senior Rabbi David Posner offered the following Hebrew lesson for all. Read the full introduction on the Emanu-El Web. **W**WE HAVE COME to wish [Mark Heutlinger] a *mazal tov*. [Yet,] the Hebrew word "mazal," which today we translate as "luck," does not mean "luck" in the Bible. Instead, "mazal" means a "star" or a "constellation."

But let's go back further than the Bible. In Akkadian, the word "mazal" is really "manzal." What does that mean? It means the abode of the gods. It's where the gods live, and this makes absolute sense because in Arabic, that same root—n-z-l—can mean divine revelation. Revelation, "nuzul," comes from "manzal," the place where the gods dwell.

In wishing Mark a *mazal tov*, we are saying more to him than "mazal tov." We are acknowledging that he is, in his way, a revelation of the Holy One, sent to us by the *Kadosh Baruch Hu* (The Holy One Blessed Be He) as a person touched by the divine spirit, as a person dedicated to this House of God. The Holy One reveals part of his nature in the character of Mark: a love and a care for His chosen people.

Twenty years ago, Mark chose to make Temple Emanu-El his home. His spirit has grown here. It fills the entire Temple. Most of all, it fills our hearts. And for that, we are all very happy. *Mazal tov*, Mark.
