WHAT MORE BEAUTIFUL way could there be for a family to welcome in the New Year than with our lively, joyous Rosh Hashanah family service? This year's service was followed by a reception for Religious School families, hosted by the Parents Association. We all enjoyed the opportunity to meet, greet and catch up after being away for the summer.

Yom Kippur saw the debut of a new program, "Teen *T'shuvah*," held at the same time as the adult study sessions. The Yom Kippur liturgy provided an opportunity for teens and their families to reflect on their actions during the past year and consider what changes to make in the year to come.

During Sukkot, at the October 17 Shabbat evening service, new Religious School families were blessed under the gorgeous sukkah in our Sanctuary. Afterwards, school families came together for dinner and Israeli dancing. That same evening, more than a dozen seventh and eighth graders spent the night at the Temple as part of our "shul-in" sleepover, which featured a late-night visit to our rooftop sukkah, located on the third floor playground. Nursery School and Religious School families also visited the rooftop sukkah, which provided

plenty of opportunities to learn about the mitzvah of inviting guests into the sukkah, as well as that of shaking the *lulav* and *etrog*.

The fall holidays culminated with a week of family worship services during each day of Religious School. Our lively, weekly *Tefilah* service was followed by a highly atypical Torah service at which the Torah scroll was unrolled entirely and brought to life by presentations from biblical characters (played by costumed members of the Religious School faculty). The service was accompanied by high school student Evan Griffith, a graduate of our confirmation program, on the organ, and Religious School student Alex Newhouse, a recent bar mitzvah, who chanted beautifully from the Torah.

We are looking ahead to many more holiday celebrations and learning opportunities over the course of this year of 5769, including our Chanukah and Passover programs for parents, our congregational Purim celebration with a hilarious production of the story of Esther and, of course, the annual Purim Carnival.

Many thanks to the Parents Association, the clergy, the faculty and the entire Temple staff for making this a special holiday season for our community!

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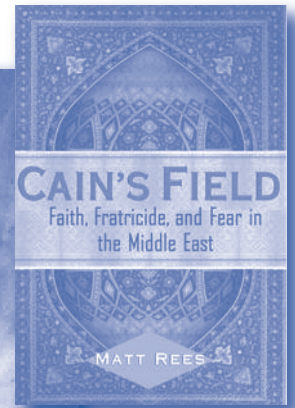
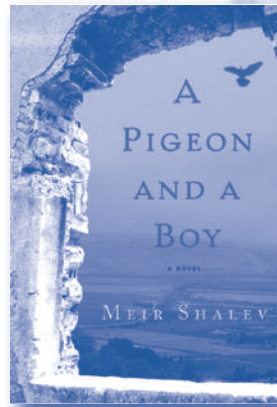
Emanu-El book groups
