Jews of Cuba: Past, present and future?

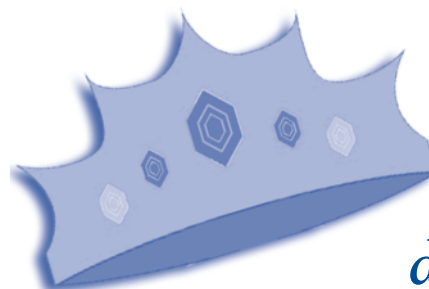

Now it is being rebuilt by the 10 percent of the Jewish population that remained after the “revolution.” As individual congregations struggle for survival with only a remnant of their former population, new strains are put upon them as some families leave for Israel. Can Judaism in Cuba survive?

We hope, too, that readers of the novel will share their impressions and continue the dialogue in a special blog that will be created on the Temple's Web site.

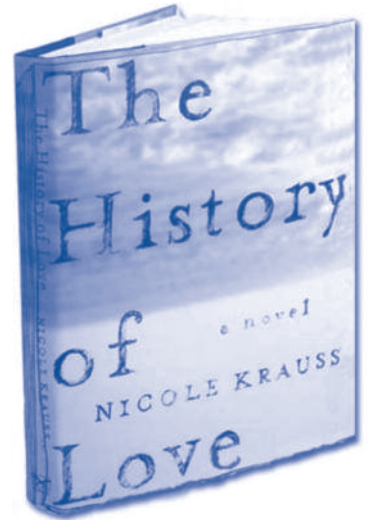

Emanu-El Reads... *The History of Love*

EMANU-EL READS... is a community learning experience through which members of the congregation read and discuss one book, studying its meaning and significance. As part of our exploration of the book's themes, a series of lectures, activities and study sessions are organized to broaden our understanding and bring the book's ideas into sharper focus.

This year's Emanu-El Reads program will be devoted to exploring a contemporary novel over the course of one month. We will be reading *The History of Love* by **Nicole Krauss**, who has been called one of the "wunderkind" generation of Jewish authors.



Krauss' novel incorporates and intertwines the stories of young lovers, married love, old friends separated by war, and parents and children. The settings range from pre-war Poland to Manhattan, Brooklyn to South America.

The History of Love is a pleasure to read. Critic Janet Maslin noted in her April 25, 2005, review, "Ms. Krauss' work is illuminated by the warmth and delicacy of her prose." Deftly treating themes of survival, loss, passionate loves of many kinds and creativity, Krauss leaves the reader with much to think about and to discuss.



OPENING LECTURE *Warsaw: The Capital of Yiddish Culture*

UNTIL WORLD WAR II, Warsaw was the center of a vibrant, rich Yiddish secular and religious cultural world. At our Emanu-El Reads opening lecture, **Dr. Samuel D. Kassow** will describe the world that gave rise to many great authors and thinkers.

Born in 1946 in Stuttgart, Germany, Kassow is the Charles Northam Professor at Trinity College, Hartford, Conn., where he has taught in the history department since 1972. The author of many articles, Kassow has served as visiting professor at Hebrew University, Princeton University, Wesleyan University, Moscow Humanities University and The Jewish Theological Seminary. His areas of interest include modern Jewish history, Russian and Soviet history, the Holocaust and modern German history. He is is fluent in English, Russian, Yiddish, Hebrew, Polish, German and French.

If I can find time to teach, then you can find time to learn!
