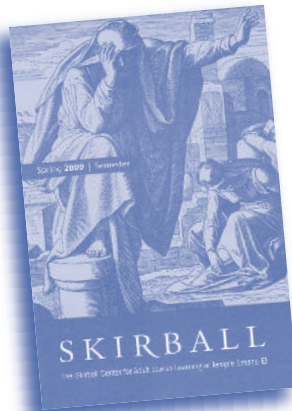
Lonely Man of Faith: The Life and Legacy of Rabbi Joseph B. Soloveitchik
