LO B'SHAMAYIM HIII: IT IS NOT IN HEAVEN...

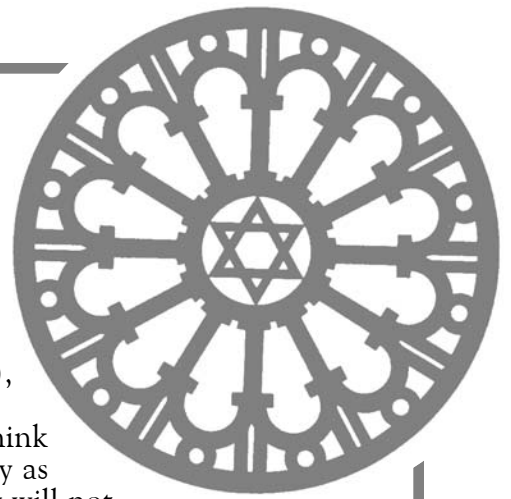
Among the most powerful ideas of Judaism is the nearness of what might otherwise seem very distant. Neither God nor the Bible is meant to be inaccessible to human beings. We all are created in God's image, and we all are meant to have immediate access to God; we need no intermediary. God does not command from far away but, rather, from immediacy that all can see and feel.

Toward the end of the Book of Deuteronomy (30: 12-14) we read:

It is not in heaven, that you should say, "Who shall go up for us to heaven and bring it to us, that we may hear it and do it?" Nor is it beyond the sea that you should say, "Who shall go over the sea for us and bring it to us, that we may hear it and do it?" But the word is very near to you, in your mouth and in your heart, that you may do it.

Similarly, the ideas of the Torah—although interpreted by only a select group of people—were given to all of us. Torah is meant to be in the hands of people, not protected from real life in some far off place. Nor, according to the Torah itself, should the Torah be placed where only the extreme arrogant or vulgar think they can reach it. According to the fourth century Talmudic

sage Rava (BT Eruvin 55a), one who is so arrogant as to think that he is as lofty as the sky certainly will not really understand (or possess) Torah.



Furthermore, Rabbi Yohanan (circa third century CE) says one who is rude or of an unpleasant spirit also will not be able to grasp Torah.

Beyond the accessibility issue, Torah should be something that is kept near to one's heart. It should be recited and should flow from our mouths, for this is how we are most likely to maintain it and perform its precepts. One is more likely to engage in the sacred acts of *mitzvot* the more one is close to the text itself. All of us can have it, all of us can love it, all of us can uphold it, and all of us can enjoy the beauty and goodness of its message.

IT IS NOT IN HEAVEN, THAT YOU SHOULD SAY, "WHO SHALL GO UP FOR US TO HEAVEN AND BRING IT TO US, THAT WE MAY HEAR IT AND DO IT?" NOR IS IT BEYOND THE SEA THAT YOU SHOULD SAY, "WHO SHALL GO OVER THE SEA FOR US AND BRING IT TO US, THAT WE MAY HEAR IT AND DO IT?" BUT THE WORD IS VERY NEAR TO YOU, IN YOUR MOUTH AND IN YOUR HEART, THAT YOU MAY DO IT.

— DEUTERONOMY 30:12-14
